"INDIVIDUALITY AND CONFORMITY" BY CELIO B. SANTOS

Individuality is defined as the particular character, or aggregate of qualities, that distinguishes one person or thing from other. Conformity, on the other hand, is defined as the process whereby people change their beliefs, attitudes, actions, or perceptions to more closely match those held by groups to which they belong or want to belong or by groups whose approval they desire. Individuality is essential for a person's character to be fully expressed. Additionally, that genuine expression of Self is necessary to achieve and maintain true freedom and happiness; on the other hand, conformity while necessary in certain circumstances, such as preserving harmony and other socially favorable standards, can prove to be an annihilator of self-expression, which in turn is a hindrance to free will. I shall explore the pros and cons of both as best as I can.

Our character, our personalities are very influenced both by our nature (our genetic pedigree) and the world around us (society), there is really no way around it at this point in time. We start our social lives very much as conformists. Heavily influenced by the first contact we have with society, which is contact with our family, the nucleus of civilization. That is where we learn to establish the foundations of our character, especially learning socially accepted norms and behaviors. And while this process is important and necessary, there comes a point or at least there should come a point in a human's life where some of our beliefs, ideologies, etc. are put into

questions, discarded or refined, and it is through this process of refinement that we start developing our authentic self, our Individuality.

Without this process taking place in some form, we unfortunately remain conformists and our true Self remains unexpressed. Not having thought about our beliefs, our perceptions, the reason(s) why we have them and so on, we cannot say that they are the fruits of our reflections. Not that there is anything wrong with the way you or I were educated necessarily, but those are things to think about as I am sure we probably do not agree with everything we've been taught at home or in society at large. How many opinions and perceptions do we hold, that are not even ours and that affect our daily thought processes and our interactions? I have done the exercise of thinking about these things and I have found plenty. That is when I decided to start putting my thoughts and opinions into question and do an exercise I enjoy. It consists of trying to pinpoint the origin of certain beliefs, attitudes, and opinions of mine. It is not always possible to do so, but when I do and if I judge it necessary, I reflect on them and determine whether they are still relevant to me, logical and in other cases, in harmony with certain personal sets of principles; these principles could be values that one hold dear or other criteria, which vary from one individual to the other.

In Freemasonry, we accept via our obligations to conform to certain rules by performing the requirements of,

and avoiding the things prohibited by Masonry. And we are even exhorted to behave in certain ways, with the goal in mind of making us better men and better members of society. This is conformity, the type of Conformity that has provided, and continues to provide harmony and strength to our organization. We conform in a way where we do not necessarily have to change our character if it already matches the expectations of Masonry, but there may be some sort of adjustment(s) and change(s) in our thought processes during the journey, as some of the concepts may not be familiar to us in the way they are put together. Now let's take this a step further, when a group of individuals like us agree to conform to certain rules we create somewhat of a uniformity. That uniformity gives to Masonry as an organization, its individuality if you will, a collective one and that individuality we should maintain and never lose; think of the point within a circle, in this analogy the point represents Masonry as whole. As individuals, we must maintain that which distinguishes us from others, even in the face of ignorance and especially not to satisfy external expectations. Both conformity and individuality can have positive and negative aspects. A person's individuality, if in complete opposition with morally accepted rules and conventions (Conformity) will be detrimental, and conforming to what is generally accepted could at times be wrong. Human history can provide us many examples of both possibilities.

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However contradictory this may seem, it is not. To find balance between the two is the key and to be intentional in our decision making is also important, in function of context and circumstances.

Let's conclude with a quote from Aristotle, which encompass the intention of this presentation: "Freedom is obedience to self-formulated rules."

How can you work on preserving your individuality and embodying it?

Have you ever been in a situation where conforming caused more harm than sticking to your individual opinion?

If so, how can you avoid it in the future?


